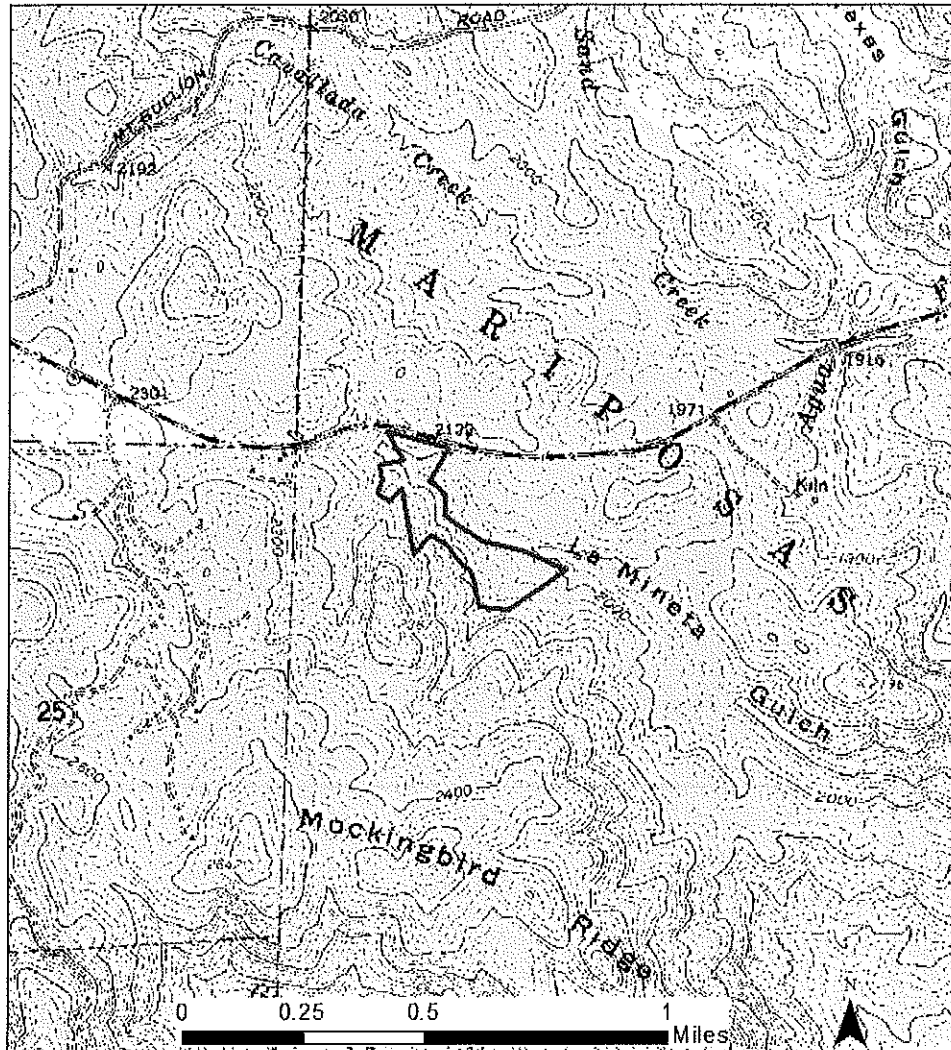

Introduction to the Study

As a partial fulfillment of California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), Culturescape has concluded a cultural resource inventory for a proposed land subdivision of property Hummingbird Lane. The proposed parcels surveyed consist of approximately 31 acres within T 5S, R 18 E M.D. B. and M in an unsectioned portion located within former Fremont Grant in Mariposa County, California located on the Catheys Valley. 7.5 Quadrangle USGS topographic map. Research consisted of a records search conducted at the Central California Information Center (CCIC), Turlock California; contact with Native American Heritage Commission and correspondence with representatives of affected tribes.

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Natural Setting:

The project area is located between 2000 and 2300 foot elevation. Geology consists of Auburn and Auburn loam a rocky soil. This is interspersed with outcrops of fragmented granitic bedrock. The landscape was transected by La Mineta Creek a small ephemeral tributary of Aqua Fria Creek. The area borders the Upper and Lower Sonoran Zone characterized by “Blue Oak, Cottonwood, and prairie grasslands (Barrett, 1933:130; Moratto, 2004:230,286). A dense Live Oak forest was located on the southern slope of the project area Heavy concentrations of poison oak were also present. The fauna in this area includes major predators such as bob cat or coyote, along with white-tail deer jackrabbit, cottontail rabbit. .

Archaeological Background

The archaeology of California can be seen as an adaptation to changing environments, learned technologies and adapting new survival strategies. These cultural phases are recognized time markers indicated by innovations in tool kits, typologies of projectile points changes in materials used as well as changes in burial customs.

Some of the earliest evidence for the presence of occupation of the Sierra Nevada has been located at sites on the western slopes in the prehistory of the central and southern sierra and it is thought to extend as far back 9500 years with the location of the Skyrocket site in Tuolumne County. This site represents a continuous occupation through stratigraphic deposits over 12.5 feet deep, and extending over six hundred yards (Fagan, 2004:86). In field survey of the Stanislaus River prior to the construction of the New Melones Dam, deposits were located at Redbud-S-347 that may involve a sequence that spans an estimated 8000-9000 years (Moratto 2004:313).

“... heavy projectile points, inferred use of the atlatl and dart, and the mano—millingstone for grinding seeds, whereas the Mariposa Complex is distinguished by lightweight projectile points, inferred use of the bow and arrow, bedrock mortar and cobble pestle” [Moratto, 2004:309]. The Milling Stone Horizon is a generic term used to describe sites that have “...significant flat crude milling stones and grinders used with them, almost no projectile points... somewhere between 6000 and 3000 B.C., more likely at the later end of this time scale” (Fagan 2004:94).

The bow and arrow was a later adaptation and is thought to have begun to be used in California around 600-800 A.D. (Moratto 2004:303). Arrow points are smaller than those of spear or dart points used earlier. The Mariposa Complex which is dated between circa A.D. 1200-1800 is thought to represent the protohistoric Sierra Miwuk “on the basis of resemblances between Mariposa projectile-point types and those from dated contexts in the Central Valley and Great Basin (Moratto 2004:309,310 citing Bennyhoff 1956: 53-54).

Historical Background/Cultural Affiliations

The cultural associations of the area include the Miwuk/Miwok tribe, a Penutian speaking group whose ancestors are thought to have occupied the area from around 1500 A.D. Termed the Madera Phase, it is thought to have occurred between 1500 A. D. and 1850 and “represents the spread and cultural florescence of ancestral Southern Sierra Miwok” (Moratto 2004:320). While bedrock mortars were still used, lightweight arrow points, olivella disc beads, steatite

artifacts and some brown ware pottery began to be seen (Moratto 2004:320). Village Communities settlement occurred after circa A.D. 1550.

Heizer (1971:370) had indicated that the Miwok practiced a political arrangement known as a *nená*, which in turn held a small tract of land that contained a spring or creek within its boundaries. "The bulk of the country was regarded ... 'every-man's land', upon which people from any *nená* might seek vegetable foods and hunt animals". Perlot (1985:123) noted that the Miwok ... "moved from the foothills to the Sierra ... in the spring and early summer to live, hunt, and collect edible seeds and roots. Then in fall they returned to the foothills to collect acorns and more seed". The village community was thought to be the result of pressure from influx of Spanish, Mexican and Caucasian influx drove the Miwok from traditional lands (Heizer 1971:376)." "... To put it in essence; a peaceful, sedentary, highly localized group underwent conversion into a semiwarlike, semi-nomadic group" (Heizer 1971:567). This disruption led directly to the Mariposa Indian War of 1850-51 (Perlot 1985: 123).

The territory of the Southern Sierra Miwok was believed to be from the Merced River to the Fresno River in the south (Moratto, 2004:290) where they bordered Yokut territory with some exceptions. The Miwok lived permanently within these areas into the San Joaquin Valley and into the Sierras with likely fluid boundaries based on political shifts between themselves and the Mono to the east (Kroeber 1976:442.443).

The first Europeans to reach the interior valleys were deserting Spanish soldiers from San Diego in 1772 and although there were no permanent settlements the interior valley became well known (Smith, 1939/1976: preface). By 1807 the mission system along the coast was well in place and at this time an expedition under the command of Color-Sergeant Gabriel Moraga was sent into the interior to locate mission sites. This expedition closely followed the present route of highway 99. This expedition continued east along Mariposa Creek. It was on this expedition that Moraga located the Merced River and proposed this area as a possible mission site (Smith 1939/1976:36; Bingaman 1968:2). On a second expedition in 1810 Moraga reversed this decision (Smith, 1936/1976: 38).

The Las Mariposas Land Grant was originally deeded to the former Mexican Governor Juan Bautista Alvarado on February, 29, 1844 by his successor Governor Micheltorena. The amount of land within the tract was 44,386.83 acres extending from the Merced River to Mariposa Creek. Alvarado recruited troops made up of local Californians and this force was sent to Las Mariposas under the command of General Jose' Castro to engage the local Indian population. While camped along the San Joaquin River, Indians stole their horses forcing their retreat. A second expedition was formed; however, they were called to duty and never made the trip either. Alvarado never made it to Las Mariposas; three years later John C Fremont took possession (Smith 1939/1976: 96, 97).

Originally Fremont had given Oliver S. Larkin \$3,000.00 to purchase one of the grants in the hills above San Jose where Fremont had noted orchards; however, Larkin purchased the Alvarado grant (Perlot 1985:92, Wood 1954:18; Fremont 1970: 10)

In 1850 Fremont had possession of the grant and sought to legitimize the claim under American law. This land was surveyed by Alexy W. Von Schmidt in 1852. This included a strip of land of about a mile and a quarter on either side of Mariposa Creek extending into the San Joaquin Valley. This claim included the towns of Bridgeport, Guadalupe, Aqua Fria, Princeton, Mt. Bullion, Mariposa, and Mormon Bar (Wood 1954:22-23). The U.S. Land Commission assigned his claim as California Land Case Number One. After initially being rejected, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in his favor on March 19, 1855 redrawing the boundary just south of

Mariposa, excluding that portion of Mariposa Creek (Radanovich 2005: 12, 13). On his arrival in Mariposa in 1849, Fremont lost six of his cowboys to Indian attacks (Smith 1976:97).

Research Design/Methodology

The methodology included a records search conducted at the CCIC. Maps on file were included. The list of the National Register of Historic Places was consulted as was the California Register of Historic Resources, the *California Inventory of Historic Resources* (1976), the *California Historical Landmarks* (1996), and the *California Points of Historical Interest listing* (May 1992 and updates) and the Historic Property Data File (Office of Historic Preservation current computer list, dated 6/12/2006), the Survey of Surveys (1989), General Land Office Survey Plat Map Township 5 South / Range 18 East and other information pertinent to the project.

In addition to the research conducted at the CCIC, the Native American Heritage Commission was contacted in an effort to locate resources contained within the sacred sites inventory, and affected tribes were contacted.

Pedestrian survey was carried out. 20 meter transects were carried out in a north to south direction. Areas of exposed bedrock were examined for possible cultural modifications. Surface areas that were exposed were investigated for lithic scatters. The ground visibility was poor with less than 5 % exposed because of heavy vegetation. Areas that had been scraped as preliminary roads were examined for anthropomorphic soils (midden), lithics, or historical artifacts or features.

The results of this were recorded in accordance with the guidelines set forth by the office of Historic Preservation guidelines in Instruction for Recording Historical Resources (1995) and *Archaeological Resource Management Reports* (ARMR) (1989). Any resources discovered during survey were recorded using forms that conformed to the standards of California Department of Parks and Recreation; the Primary Record (DPR 523A), Archaeological Site Record (DPR 523C). Photographs of resources as well as appropriate documentation were addressed at the time of discovery. Resource locations were recorded using a Trimble Geo Explorer CE/ XH with sub-meter. The projection for UTM coordinates were CONUS NAD 83.

Report of Findings:

Records Search: The results of the records search of a 1/4mile radius of the APE and related research indicated that two previous surveys had taken place, MP-413 and MP-3908. MP-413 was conducted for a proposed land split that included the APE and MP-3908 that was conducted by Caltrans for the construction of the passing lane that was just along the property boundary. Both studies occurred in 1980. The CCIC search indicated that two previously recorded sites P-22-887 and P-22-885 were located within the project area. Both were recorded in 1980. Four other sites had been recorded within ¼ mile of the APE. P-22-886 and P-22-881 are represented by the same location map. P-22-2638 is also plotted very close to these and all may be associated with the Ortega /Sorrel mine that was established in 1850. P-22-2668 was located as a result of a highway survey for historic built environment relating to water run-off on the highway.

Contact with the NAHC were negative for sacred sites. The NAHC did provide the names of Les James, Spiritual Leader of the Southern Sierra Miwok and Lois Martin, Tribal Chairman for the Southern Sierra Miwok. Letters describing the project area were sent to both parties on December 13, 2014. Follow-up telephone calls were conducted on December 29, 2014. Les James did not have any personal knowledge and referred me to Bill Tucker. An attempt to contact both Bill Tucker and Lois Martin on December 29, 2014 and a message was left with contact information on the project.

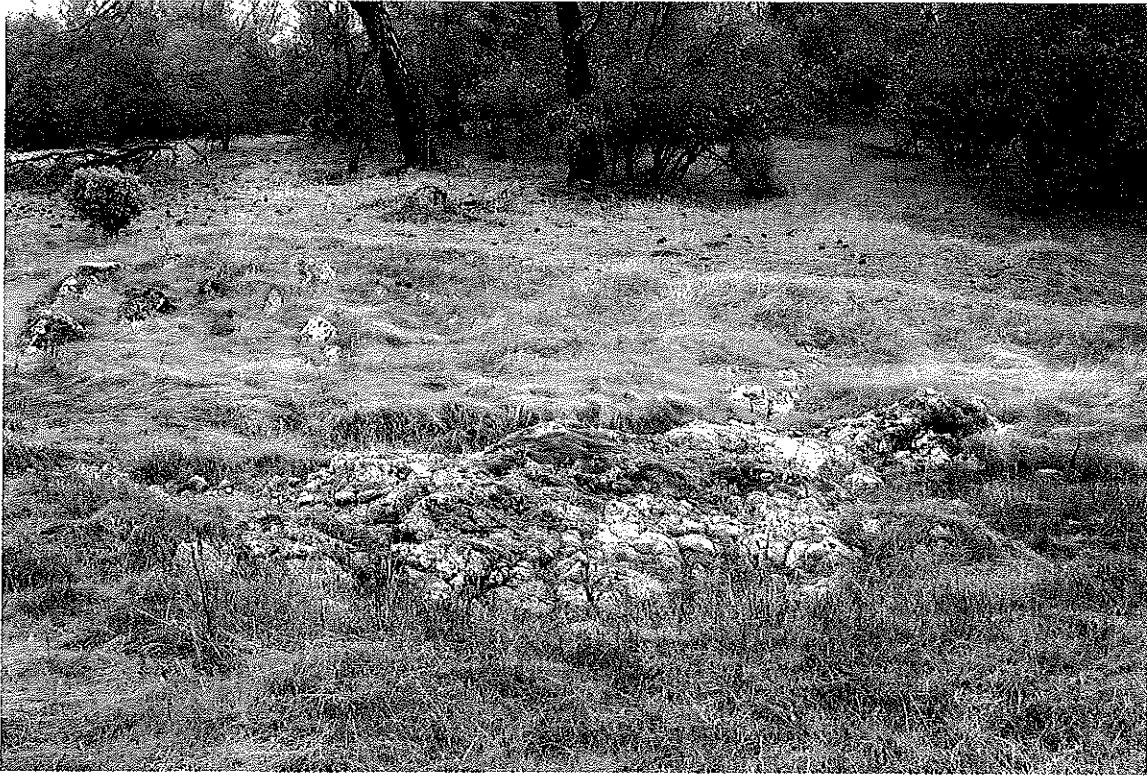


Figure 4: 12/13/14 11:30am Overview of P-22-000887 bisected by La Mineta Creek N

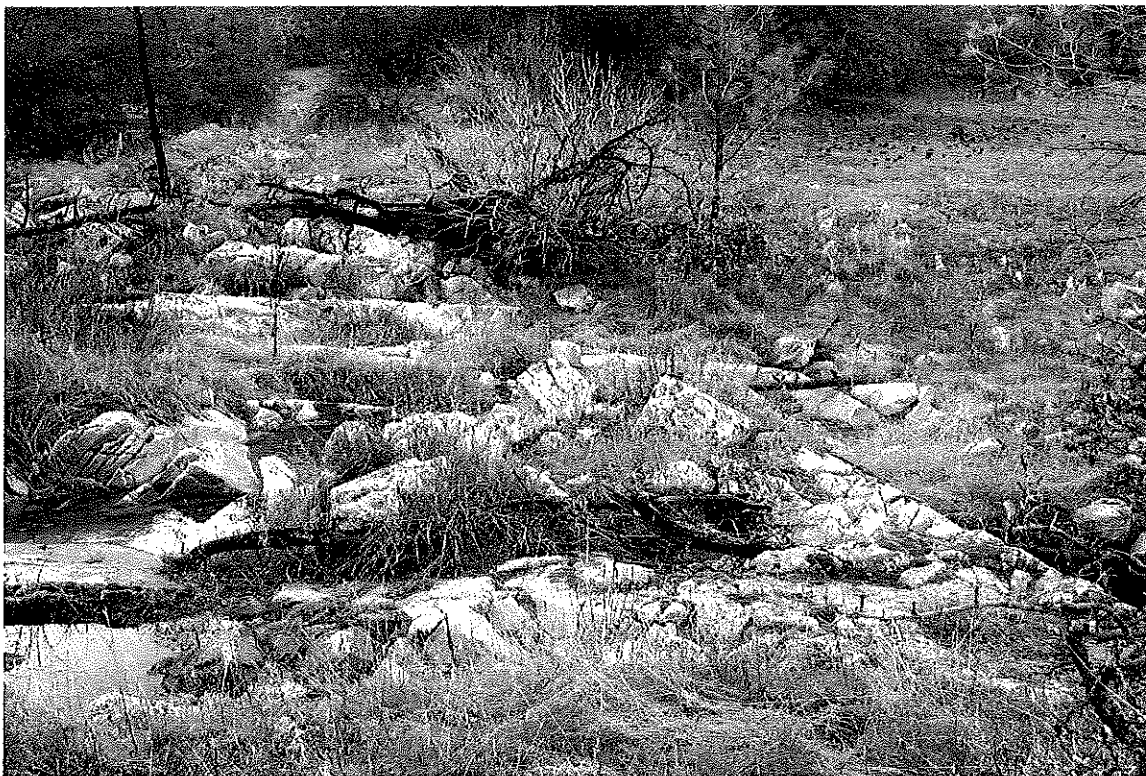


Figure 5: 12/13/14 1:35 Overview of outcrop /w BRM at HBL_MK1 N

Survey was hampered by a heavy growth of live oak and poison oak along with invasive plants everywhere within the project area. The results of this survey were the re-location of two previously recorded sites and the discovery of an additional single mortar cup within La Mineta Creek. Site P-22-885 was located east of its plotted location on adjacent property. A UTM point and photograph was taken only and records updated accordingly. A second site P-22-887 was located on either side of La Mineta Creek which marked the property boundary. The site record was updated within the APE. The single cup was recorded on a DPR 523 Primary Record as P-22-3663.

Comments/Discussion

All resources located within the APE during this survey are located in close proximity to the creek and appear to be discreet. The lack of associated artifacts inhibits understanding of the cultural context. Should any prehistoric or historical components, be uncovered that is, resources possessing physical evidence of human activities over 45 years old, then all work is to stop and a qualified professional of the appropriate discipline is to be contacted to evaluate the discovery.

Site P-22-887 was located on the adjacent property and only a UTM point and photograph were taken. Because midden was indicated in the previous report the area should be considered as sensitive. The normal set back associated for creeks should be sufficient as a buffer provided, however, because the possibility of prehistoric midden associated with milling features, it is recommended that an area of 25 feet be set aside as a buffer and that any subsurface disturbance planned for an area of 50 feet surrounding this area have consultation with a professional archaeologist prior to activities to formulate a plan for evaluation and to monitor for cultural resources.

Should human remains be encountered during ground disturbance, as provided by Health and Safety Code section 7050.5. If human remains are uncovered during future work, then all work is to stop until the county coroner can determine whether the remains are subject to provisions of the Government Code. Pursuant to the Public Resources code 5097.98 if the coroner finds that the remains are not subject to his or her authority and if the coroner recognizes the human remains to be Native American, the coroner has 24 hours to contact the Native American Heritage Commission. They will contact the most likely descendent who will make recommendations on how to proceed. The most likely descendent has twenty four hours to respond. If the most likely descendent does not respond in twenty four hours the owner may reinter the remains in an area of the property secure from further disturbance, or: If the owner doesn't accept the descendants recommendations, the owner or the descendent may request mediation by the Native American Heritage Commission.

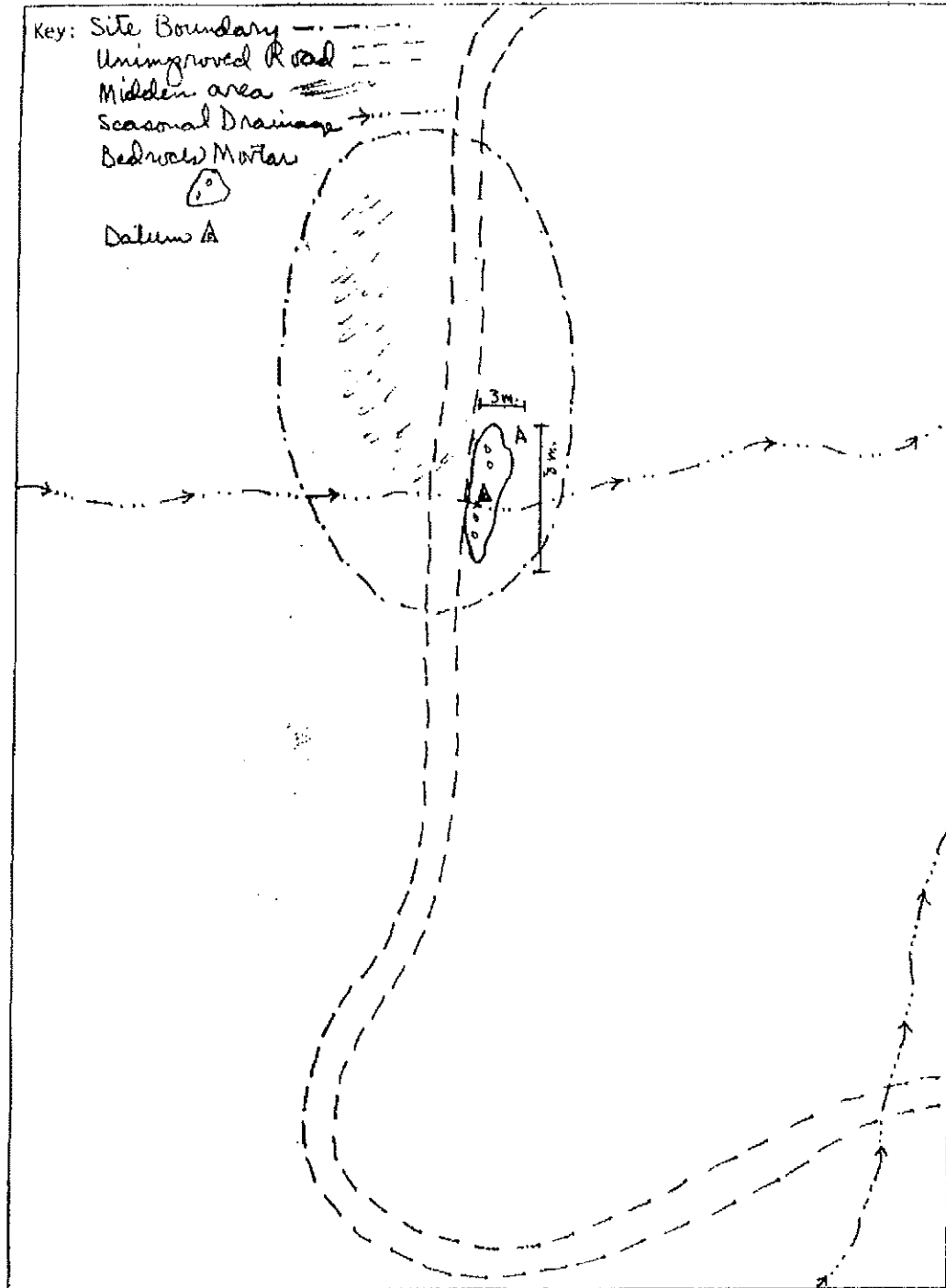
